Crawfish and Shrimp Menu Labeling Law

▶ For Food Service Establishments that Use Menus

Any food service establishment that sells or provides cooked or prepared crawfish or shrimp that originate outside of the United States, must "permanently" display the following disclaimer in a clearly visible location on all menus:

"Some items served at this establishment may contain imported crawfish or shrimp. Ask for more information."

<u>Please note</u> that the law no longer allows for temporary fixes such as hand lettered signs, paper clipping, etc. as a form of compliance.

For Food Service Establishments that Do Not Use Menus

If a food service establishment does not use a menu as a standard business practice, the establishment must:

- Provide a sign posted as the main entrance to the establishment that states: "Some items served at this establishment may contain imported seafood. Ask for more information."
- The sign must be at least 18 inches tall and 18 inches wide and be written in English.
- Lettering must not be less than 1 inch in size.
- The sign must be posted in a conspicuous location not less than 36 inches from the floor.

> Fine Assessment Per Menu or Signage Violation

- First offense: \$500 per violation
- Second offense: \$1000 per violation
- Third offense and subsequent offense: \$2000 per violation
